Nothing but a Man

by Michael Roemer | USA | 1964 | 93 mins

Not previously available for UK audiences, this film had a major impact in John F Kennedy's USA subtly exposing the apartheid-like conditions in the southern states. You would not think this film was made fifty years ago. The dignity and resolve of its leading character and his graceful wife contribute to a pioneering and enduring independent work. And the soundtrack is stunning. *(JD)*

by Hirokazu Kore-eda | Japan | 2013 | 120 mins Japanese with English subtitles

A chance encounter between a security guard at Vienna's Museum of Art History, and a lonely Canadian visitor allows Cohen to speculate on art, love and life. Beautifully photographed and observed, its languid pace may initially frustrate, but the developing and complex interweaving of Breughel's paintings and the city of Vienna, with the developing relationship between the protagonists is steadily engrossing and moving. For the first time in her life she feels able to confess her deepest feelings, believing he has become her 'Patience Stone', a mystical jewel which, according to Persian mythology, will deliver her from her pain and torment. *(TA)*

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This slow-burn thriller is an incisive portrait of a marriage and an inventive *policier*. Paul, a successful surgeon, is flattered by the attentions of a former patient. Gradually, however, chasms open up between Paul and his wife, exposing previously ignored fault lines in their marriage. This is an adult, controlled and involving piece of cinema. *(JP)*

Hannah Arendt

by Margarethe von Trotta | Germany/Luxembourg | 2012 113 mins | German with English subtitles

Jewish political theorist, Hannah Arendt reported on the Eichmann war crimes trial, coining the phrase 'the banality of evil'. The nature of totalitarianism and evil were a central concern for her until her death in 1975. The director is known for films that examine events in German history and their impact on women's lives. (*MT*)

by Benedikt Erlingsson | Iceland/Germany | 2013 81 mins | Icelandic and Swedish with English subtitles
